Dear Friends

"No one should spend so much time in contemplation that they ignore the needs of their neighbour, nor be so absorbed in action that they feel no need for contemplation of God." St Augustine

Fr Paul refers to this quote in his Prayer Resource and I have also seen it pop up on various Augustinian sites over the last few months as it does so aptly reflect life for many of us at the moment. The reality of the pandemic meant some experienced an increase in their workload and stress as they were required to do the same or more work but in difficult conditions. Others were plunged into the frightening world of unemployment or business owners saw their work dry up with breathtaking suddenness. The foundations of their life crumbling beneath them leaving nothing but time. Time to worry. Time to fear.

We wonder – where is God in all of this? The answer for me, as always, is within each other and ourselves.

"One of the very graced aspects of what it is to be human is our need for each other. Our need for relationship, connection and presence." Beautiful words spoken by Fr Peter Jones, Augustinian Prior Provincial, in a homily livestreamed from North Harbour Parish during lockdown. These words take shape in the reports provided from Friends on the pages of this newsletter. Reports from Melbourne, Brisbane and Mareeba reflect on the balance between personal prayer and the importance of contact and service to others. These echoing themes remind me of the arch of our formation series a few years ago Interiority, Prayer, Action. We may all have had the experience of finding "a pearl of great price" within ourselves and our community.

What strange times we have been through!

There has been much to be thankful for, much to pray about, and much to be alert to.

As we all went into Lock Down, I am sure you experienced a certain fear, were faced with numerous questions, and wondered how you would cope with the challenges of isolation.

Like many of you I collected a bundle of books from the Library, made sure that I was eligible for Coles On-Line Delivery Service and set about creating a possible agenda for each day.

Prayer featured in that agenda, and as I had made several attempts over the years to daily pray the Divine Office, now seemed the perfect time for another such attempt. Sara Maitland, in The Tablet of May 16, had this to say about this prayer of the church. As the 'base line' of my prayer I use the Church's Divine Office. I do so because I think that for me having a regular and external discipline is helpful, because I love the Psalms, and because — living and therefore praying alone—it gives me a sense of community and solidarity with the Church.

Although both Sara and I struggle with the non-inclusive language of this great prayer we keep on.

Sorting boxes of family photos, left over files from various history writing projects and the residue of moving house provided me with challenging tasks on a daily basis.

I imagine that my nephews and nieces may well be grateful to Covid 19 in time to come!

In the PM of each day it was time for a *phon-a-thon* to those who may be at home alone, to those one had failed to be in touch with over Christmas and to those one missed all the time. It was in this daily phon-a-thon that I found some semblance of *eucharist*, noting the increased use of 'God bless you' by those who were phoned.

Some time ago my niece, who had been living with me, made the suggestion that I should outline plans and instructions for my funeral, whenever? Family seem pleased that this is done.

During this unusual time of reflection, prayer, and of being alone came a wonderful link to *The Confessions*. Art Purcaro OSA of Villanova University, U.S.A. was offering reflections and insights into each of the 13 books, perfect timing, and so valuable.

Whilst we are now beginning to be back in touch with people and moving out from home I for one will always be thankful for the time of quiet reflection and of prayer possibilities.

A Report from the Mareeba Friends of St Augustine Effects of the Global Pandemic in Mareeba

Covid 19 has had an enormous impact on the whole world, including our township of Mareeba. As the world has faced the challenging changes, so have we.

Fr Rob and Deacon Ralph have still been kept quite busy with the usual running of the Parish, even though they have been constrained by the restrictions, Deacon Ralph celebrated 11 years as a Deacon during the Pandemic and enjoyed a quiet celebration with his family and friends.

The ABC regarding the community in Coen interviewed Fr Rob. They inquired how they were faring. Fr Rob was able to report that they were soldiering on and coping quite well despite missing their monthly Mass and visits. Both Fr Rob and Deacon Ralph have also been celebrating daily Mass in the Priory chapel for the people of the Parish.

The Friends have also been busy, keeping in contact over the phone and emails, watching Mass and daily prayers on line with Bishop James Foley and the many other activities they have ventured into with more time up their sleeves.

Ultimately, however, as Fr Rob said in one of his regular letters to the Parish, the Pandemic is a time to make time for prayer at home with the Rosary being especially suited for this purpose. May this time of trial draw us closer to each other and to our God.
